
BECOMING CALTECH CALTECH ARCHIVES EXHIBIT



IN MEMORIAM

ETHEL STRATTON "BUNNY" GOULD

MARCH 8 1927 - DECEMBER 23, 2019

We are sad to announce the passing of former club member "Bunny Gould." Ethel Savage Stratton, grew up in Eagle Rock, CA and was known as Bunny since she was a child. She was a graduate of Westridge School in 1945, and a graduate of Vassar College in 1949.

She was married to Roy W. Gould, Caltech Simon Ramo Professor (now Emeritus), for 67 years and they had two children, Diana and Robert. Bob passed away in 2014. Bunny had many interests: including music, dancing, art, architecture, mathematics, and travel. While at Vassar College, she frequently traveled to New York City, where she studied dance with Merce Cunningham and Martha Graham.



In the late forties, she played several bit parts in movies from Paramount Pictures, where her father served as Art Director and Purchasing Agent. After attending Vassar College, she was employed by North American Aviation as a mathematician and computer programmer in the very early days of digital computers. She met her future husband there. She also worked as a mathematician for a few years at the Electro Data Corporation in Pasadena.

She served as a member of the Pasadena Symphony Board of Directors when Daniel Lewis and Jorge Mester were conductors. She continued to attend Symphony performances for many years. She also enjoyed jazz music and often attended Annual Jazz Parties in Chautauqua, NY, San Diego, CA and Ojai, CA.

Bunny dedicated five years to make the book "Linda Vista, Portrait of a Neighborhood" a reality. She was responsible for the architectural research and history, and writing. She collaborated with Ralph Melching, who was responsible for photograph assembly, and writing.

She was a longtime member of the Caltech Women's Club, where she led Architectural Tours of the Campus through CATS. She also initiated and led a regular Caltech tour group, the Gallery Goers, to art and architecture sites and events in the Los Angeles area.





On May 10, 2001, CATS was honored for their volunteer service to the Institute at a special ceremony. Beautifully calligraphed certificates were handed to each member by the administration represented by President David Baltimore, Bob O'Rourke, VP for Public Relations, and Jerry Nunnally, VP for Institute Relations.

EXPLORING THE PAST WITH NEW TECHNOLOGY: CLIMATE, EPIDEMICS, AND THE FALL OF AN EMPIRE



Our November 21st Program started off with a wine and cheese reception upstairs in Gates-Thomas Laboratory and then moved to the Auditorium where it featured archaelogist Sarah Yeomans explaining how interdisciplinary research has allowed earth science and biology (including the field of paleopathology) to contribute to decoding archaeological mysteries. In particular, she spoke of the impact of climate change and disease as factors contributing to the Fall of the Roman Empire.

The Roman Empire occurred during a time period when there was a relatively warm and stable climate. This warm period lead to agriculture, sedentary communities and civilization and allowed Egypt to grow the grain so it could serve as the breadbasket of Rome. However, over time the climate changed from the Roman Climate Optimum of $200 \, \text{BCE} - 150 \, \text{CE}$ to the transitional Roman warm period of $150 \, \text{CE} - 450 \, \text{CE}$, and then to the Late Antique Little Ice Age of $450 \, \text{CE} - 700 \, \text{CE}$.

The Roman trade network which was so adept at moving goods around the Roman Empire also contributed to the spread of disease. Infections also spread easily when they encountered the population density of Roman cities. As the Empire expanded it introduced pathogens to new regions where the locals were not used to them, and also brought microbes back from the outer regions to Rome which were then redispersed to outlying regions. The movement of army personnel was a major factor as soldiers were reassigned to new locations and often lived in cramped conditions. Soldiers often bore the brunt of these epidemics. Thus, these pandemics contributed to decimated armies and a weakened empire.

The Antonine Plague (163 – 180 CE) was brought back by troops from East Asia and its symptoms included fever, lesions, dysentery and nausea. Measles has been ruled out as the cause of this plague since it is genetically too young to have been present then. So that left smallpox as the cause of this plague. Researchers studying Roman tax documents (Oxyrhynchus papyri) found that in one location one third of adult men disappeared or relocated within a two-month period. This loss of population, through mortality or relocation to avoid illness, significantly reduced the tax base. The laborers who survived were more valuable and earned more for their work since the cost of labor doubled.

A drought which led to famine and then relocation contributed to the next pandemic. The Plague of Cyprian (249 – 262 CE) was a hemorrhagic fever, similar to Ebola, brought from North Africa into the Roman Empire. This led to a period of destabilization where twenty Emperors reigned over a 50-year period. The army was weakened and sometimes went without pay.

Studying ice cores and tree rings, scientists have found a global event in 536 CE (most likely volcanic in origin) that led to climate cooling from a dust ring lingering in the atmosphere. This destabilized food production and led to famine. In order to alleviate food shortages, grain stores were emptied, but as grain moves so do rats and fleas who carry with them Yersinia Pestis, the cause of the bubonic plague. Starting in Egypt and spreading north this was the first occurrence of the bubonic plague in Europe, known as the first outbreak of the Justinian Plague (541 - 544 CE). These three pandemics and the climate changes that occurred during this era were factors in the end of the Roman Empire



CALTECH'S ICONIC WILSON COURT BUNGALOWS

Moved and Renovated to Make Way for the new Chen Neuroscience Research Center By Judi Cowell and Christina Souto



Pasadena is considered the birthplace of the bungalow court, a collection of small one-to-two bedroom houses with common space in between. Developed generally from 1909 to 1942, bungalow courts were originally meant for transient, seasonal use, but over time became permanent residences sought for their unique architectural style, according to a city report.

Caltech's iconic Wilson Court Bungalows is one of 43 bungalow courts with historic significance in Pasadena. Wilson Court is a vernacular example of the Spanish Colonial Revival style, which was popular between 1915 and 1940. These are commonly found in Pasadena and Southern California in general. While this style originated in the Craftsman Style, it is not uncommon to see later examples in the Spanish Colonial Revival styles.

Wilson Court is comprised of seven buildings originally located at 294 South Wilson Avenue within the Vickery's Subdivision on the corner of East Del Mar Boulevard and South Wilson Avenue in Pasadena.

Contractor Whitescarver and Picton completed five of the buildings in 1923 and builder S. Russell Johnson completed the two additional buildings in the

same year. The first five buildings constructed by Whitescarver and

Picton were configured in a U-shape pattern and were originally running east and west around an open green courtyard. The two buildings constructed by S. Russell Johnson ran along East Del Mar Boulevard.

Three parking structures were present on the site as early as 1931; one of these structures was replaced with an open carport in 1957. In addition to the garage demolition, early alterations to the property

were completed in 1928, including a window which was removed and replaced by a door. A 6'x12' porch was added to the two-story building by the owner, Jacob Chitrin.

According to the 1940 census, the occupants of Wilson Court included Jacob Chitrin (the owner) and his family, an accountant, a decorator, clerks, chauffeurs, sales manager, a cable splicer, a plumber, and some instructors at Caltech.

Caltech acquired the property in 1972. The units primarily housed graduate students until 2017 when they were relocated.

To fast track the construction Caltech wanted to break ground on the "Tianqiao and Chrissy Chen Neuroscience Research Building" in early 2018. To do this, they had to overcome the challenge of preserving Caltech's Iconic Wilson Court Bungalows. At first, Caltech offered to pay part of the relocation costs if a private party would take the bungalows, but there were few sites in Pasadena that could accommodate the homes. The institute has successfully relocated 40 buildings for preservation in the last 25 years with most moving off campus.

Unfortunately, they were unable to find someone to take the seven buildings in the bungalow court configuration in time to meet their 2018 Chen groundbreaking milestone. To retain their historical significance the building had to be relocated into the same configuration. To keep the Chen construction on track, Caltech made plans to

pick up and move seven historic bungalows to a parking lot two blocks away.



In the dark of the early morning on May 30, 2017, a bungalow parade began to move the courtyard and by noon, all 7 buildings were at their new site: 1031 San Pasqual. Over the next two years they set on

new foundations and completely restored the Bungalows to meet the Secretary of the Interiors Standards for Historic Preservation. Their eventual architecture is almost exactly as they were built in 1923. The design and construction was overseen by the City Historical Preservation Board.




The "new" bungalow court is located on the corner of San Pasqual and South Catalina. The buildings remain in their historic layout, however, the five buildings now run north to south in a U-shape pattern and the two additional buildings flank the court on South Catalina.

Six of the bungalow court buildings are single story. These buildings have a similar building footprint and floor plan. The seventh building is a two story, comprised of a two-bedroom unit upstairs and a spacious, ADA unit downstairs. All buildings have two entrances, each with steps from grade to landing, and covered porches at all front entrances.

The Bungalow Court remains residential, as it was used from its conception. However, instead of clerks, sales managers, and cable splicers, the Bungalow Court will be occupied primarily by faculty, visiting faculty, visiting associates and Moore Scholars. The Bungalow Court will be managed by Faculty Housing within the Facilities Department.


